The Gospel of St. Luke

³⁶ The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine ³⁷ and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" ³⁸ There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews. ³⁹ One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" ⁴⁰ But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? ⁴¹ And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." ⁴² Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." ⁴³ He replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

¹ In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ² He was in the beginning with God. ³ All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being ⁴ in him was life, and the life was the light of all people.

⁵ The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. ⁶ There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. ⁷ He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. ⁸ He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. ⁹ The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. ¹⁰ He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. ¹¹ He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. ¹² But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, ¹³ who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God. ¹⁴ And the Word became flesh and lived among us,

and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

"The glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth" From John. "Full of Grace and truth" the scripter said, but what is truth? What is your first thought when hear the word truth? You might say "not lying" but that is only half the story. Truth is telling people what they need to hear. Instead of what they want, or what they expect. Whether that be telling your best friend that the relationship they were in was not the healthiest, or you just got the news that you did not get an interview for that job you really wanted. The truth can hurt. I know that you know that we all know that. We hate what the truth is in most moments. But it can also be the light at the end of the tunnel.

Take Luke for example. When Jesus was being nailed to the cross, right before he was crucified, he was put in between two common criminals, all were facing the same punishment. The criminal on his right was mocking Jesus. He said, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, His chosen one!" The criminal on his left found this obscure, (as would I, have I been in his shoes) The man on his left said "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? 

Take me for example. right now, there is someone in my life that is not the best for me, and I know one way or another I must leave them in the past. But you know what else is the truth? The fact that when I leave, that it will be my Paradise. Just like the man from Luke was promised.

The man from Luke knew he was about to die, he knew his end, and asked Jesus nothing more than to just be remembered and was rewarded Paradise.
